# Matisse Inspired Collage



### **Teaching points to consider:**

- Develop children's confidence of the shapes by giving them opportunity to draw/ trace them
- Tissue paper will get fragile and rip when too wetensure a thin layer of glue is used (support may be needed)
- Start discussion about light and transparency of materials

## **Key Questions:**

- What do the shapes in Matisse's work remind you of?
- Will the light shine through the tissue paper?
- Which material will block out the light?
- How can you create many of the same shape when cutting out?
- What does your final piece remind you of?

## You will need... ☐ Tissue Paper (coloured translucent plastic could also be used) ☐ Plastic Sheets (you could use *laminating pouches, plastic* document wallets or any recycled plastic sheets) ☐ White or black card (black card creates a solid *silhouette)* ☐ PVA glue

## **Skills developed:**

- ✓ Scissor skills
- ✓ Layering materials
- ✓ Understanding of light, silhouettes and translucency

## **Key Vocabulary:**

Silhouette
Shadow Shapes
Translucency Repeated

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### **Cross curricular links:**

#### **Science**

Exploring light and shadows and the transparency of different materials Can the children predict how the light will shine... what parts will block the light completely?

#### RE

Explore stained glass windows found on traditional Christian churches. What stories do they tell? Does the tissue paper give the same effect?

#### Maths

Repeated patterns- what shapes are repeated? What patterns can you spot?

## **Link to Artists:**

#### **Henri Matisse**

Make sure children are exposed to his collage work and can use for starting points

## Simplification and adaptation for younger children:

- Provide pre- drawn large leaf shapes to focus on developing cutting skills as opposed to drawing skills- this will support children who need to focus on their hand-eye coordination
- Focus on creating one section (one large shape cut out) to add to a collaborative project

## **Extension/ next steps:**

- A collaborative project where children contribute one or two sections to a whole piece that covers a window
- Exploring cutting other shapes- based on drawings of a still life?
- Classroom set up could include a plastic contact sheet on a window that children have the opportunity to added too based on an interchangeable theme
